Grant Name: Education, Training and Enhanced Services to End Violence Against and Abuse of Women with Disabilities Call for Concept Papers, CFDA # 16.529

Funder: US DOJ/Office of Violence Against Women

Eligibility: States; units of local government; Nonprofit and nongovernmental victim services organizations, such as State domestic violence or sexual assault coalitions, or nonprofit, nongovernmental organizations, faith-based or community-based organizations serving disabled individuals.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$200K - \$750K over 3 years. This call for concept papers is the first step in the process of selecting six to fifteen multidisciplinary teams that will be funded under the Disability Grant Program in FY 2007. Awards will be made as cooperative agreements and will be made for up to \$750,000 for a three year period. Multidisciplinary teams that are funded with Disability Grant Program funds will be required to set aside \$200,000 to support the first year planning phase. The remaining \$550,000 will be used to support the implementation phase of the project during years two and three. A special condition will be included on all cooperative agreements that restrict access to only \$200,000 in year one. Remaining funds will be released upon successful completion of the first year planning requirements. Applicants should be aware that OVW will play a substantial role in shaping and monitoring the project and intensive technical assistance will be provided to each multi-disciplinary team.

Summary: Congress, OVW, and victim advocates recognized the need to focus on domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and sexual assault against individuals with disabilities due to the proliferation of such violence and the gaps in service provision and the criminal justice response for this population. The goal of this program is to build the capacity of such jurisdictions to address such violence against individuals with disabilities through the creation of multi-disciplinary teams.

Disability Grant Program recipients will provide training, consultation, and information on domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, and sexual assault against individuals with disabilities (as defined in section 3 of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C.12102)), and enhance direct services to such individuals.

Grant Name: Co-Occurring Mental Illness, Alcohol and/or Drug Abuse & Medical Conditions, CFDA #s 93.242, 93.273, 93.279

Funder: US Dept of HHS/NIH

Eligibility: Public/State Controlled Institution of Higher Education; Private Institution of Higher Education; Nonprofit with 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Nonprofit without 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Small Business; For-Profit Organization (Other than Small Business); State Government; Regional Organization; Other(s): Eligible agencies of the Federal government; Faith-based or community based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Not specified.

Summary: A significant number of individuals simultaneously suffer from mental illness, problem alcohol and/or drug use, and other medical or physical disorders, such as mood disorders compounded with substance abuse, chronic pain with depression and/or alcohol abuse, schizophrenia with heroin use and hepatitis C. This funding opportunity announcement (FOA) encourages innovative and theory-driven empirical research to examine the organization, management, integration, dissemination and implementation, and financing of services for co-occurring mental illness, alcohol and/or drug abuse, and commonly co-occurring medical conditions, as well as the impact of these factors on the quality, cost, access, utilization, outcomes, and cost and cost effectiveness of care. Some examples of research areas: access to services, tailoring services to individual needs, integrated, coordinated, or collaborative care services, treatment process, commonly used interventions and practices, rehabilitation and community integration, dissemination and implementation research, culture and gender.

Grant Name: Coming Up Taller Awards

Funder: National Endowment for the Arts

Eligibility: 501(c)(3) organization, unit of state or local government which operates a program for children and youth outside the school day. Program must have been operational for 5 years with one or more disciplines of the humanities/arts as core content of the program.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$10,000.

Summary: By honoring excellence in after-school and out-of-school arts and humanities programs for young people through the Coming Up Taller Awards, we seek to promote a creative, engaged, skilled, and confident generation of young people. Each year the Coming Up Taller Awards recognize and reward excellence in after-school and out-of-school arts and humanities programs for underserved children and youth. Award recipients receive \$10,000 each, an individualized plaque, and an invitation to attend the annual Coming Up Taller Leadership Enhancement Conference. We encourage programs initiated by museums, libraries, performing arts organizations, universities, colleges, arts centers, community service organizations, schools, businesses, and eligible government entities to consider participating.

Name: Goldman Sachs Foundation

Funding Priorities: The Foundation's mission is to promote innovation and excellence in education worldwide. Funding priorities are determined by a periodic assessment of needs and opportunities in the field of education. Current priorities are to enhance academic performance and prospects for life achievement of students at the secondary school level, to

develop the abilities of promising high potential youth worldwide, and to support high quality education for young people in business and entrepreneurship.

Award Size: Not specified

Eligibility: The Foundation will consider supporting effective, high quality organizations that implement achievement-oriented education programs; produce substantial, measurable results; and have a well-delineated plan for broad dissemination and outreach.

Name: US Soccer Foundation

Funding Priorities: For 2007, the Foundation will award Grants exclusively to projects and programs that develop players, coaches, and referees in economically disadvantaged urban areas. This year we are focusing on approximately 340 "urban areas" that include populations of 100,000 or more. The one exception to this exclusive

focus is the Foundation's All Conditions Fields (ACF) Grants. ACF Grants support the construction of state-of-the-art synthetic grass soccer fields and will continue to be available to projects serving all types of communities, though the highest priority will be given to projects serving players in economically disadvantaged urban areas.

Award Size: \$100,000 maximum, one-year awards.

Eligibility: The Foundation's grants program is open to anyone with a soccer-specific program or project that benefits a non-for-profit purpose and meets the established focus for the 2007 grant cycle.

Review Cycle: As of this date, there is no cycle until September of 2007. Reviewing occurs between September and November.

Name: National Book Scholarship Fund

Funding Priorities: The NBSF provides local literacy programs throughout the United States with New Readers Press books and other educational materials. The NBSF supports family literacy

programs, English-as-a-second-language (ESL) projects, adult basic education programs, and women-focused literacy and ESL programs.

Award Size: NBSF grants are made in the form of the New Readers Press materials requested in the grant proposal. Grants typically average \$2,000 but have ranged from \$500 to \$5,000 depending on the needs of the applicant organization.

Eligibility: To be eligible for an NBSF grant, applicant must:

1. Have a clearly defined, specific need or project for the materials being requested. Alternatively, the organization may have a financial need for the requested materials.
2. Provide evidence that the NBSF materials will be used directly with students receiving literacy instruction, and/or with literacy staff, tutors, or volunteers.
3. Provide evidence that the materials requested will be used to support an educational program.
4. Be willing to participate in public relations/public awareness activities.

5. Not have received an NBSF grant during the 2004-2005 or 2005-2006 program cycles.
