Grant Name: Health Services Research on the Prevention and Treatment of Drug and Alcohol Abuse, CFDA #s 93.273, 93.279

Funder: US Dept of HHS/NIH

Eligibility: Public/State Controlled

Institution of Higher Education; Private Institution of Higher Education; Nonprofit with 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Nonprofit without 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Small Business; For-Profit Organization (Other than Small Business); State Government; Regional Organization; Other(s): Eligible agencies of the Federal government; Faith-based or community based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: TBA – no funds allocated yet.

Summary: This (FOA) solicits health services research on the prevention and treatment of drug and alcohol abuse. Proposed research might emphasize any of the following subjects: (1) Factors that affect the delivery of drug and alcohol abuse intervention and related services, such as social factors, personal behaviors and attributes, financing, organization, management, and health technologies; (2) Dimensions of drug and alcohol abuse intervention and related services, such as accessibility, utilization, quality, effectiveness, and costs; (3) Processes of blending science-based practices into community-based provision of drug and alcohol abuse prevention services; and (4) Research tools to facilitate higher quality health services research on drug and alcohol abuse. -Mechanism of Support. This FOA will use the NIH Research Project Grant (R01) award mechanism and runs in parallel with two FOAs of identical scientific scope, PA-06-307, which solicits applications under the

Exploratory/Developmental Grant (R21) award mechanism, and PA-06-308, which solicits applications under the Small Research Grant (R03) award mechanism.

Grant Name: Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders Program, CFDA # 16.590.

Funder: USDOJ/Office on Violence Against Women

Eligibility: States, units of local government; state and local courts (including juvenile courts), faith-based and community organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Award amounts are capped based on population, as follows:

- Up to 500,000 = cap of \$400K
- 500,001 to 900,000 = cap of \$750K
- Over 900,000 = cap of \$1.5MM

Award period is 24 months.

Summary: The Grants to Encourage Arrest Policies and Enforcement of Protection Orders Program (hereinafter referred to as the Arrest Program) recognizes that domestic violence¹, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking are crimes that require the criminal justice system to hold offenders accountable for their actions through investigation, arrest, and prosecution of violent offenders, and through close judicial scrutiny and management of offender behavior. At each juncture in the criminal justice process, concerns for victim safety should guide the actions of all partners in the system. Criminal justice agencies must collaborate among themselves and in meaningful partnership with nonprofit, nongovernmental sexual assault and domestic violence programs, including local shelters, rape crisis centers, victim service organizations and domestic violence coalitions, to ensure that victim safety is a paramount consideration in the development of any strategy to address these crimes. Additionally, representatives from criminal justice agencies working to prevent and reduce domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking, must have a clear understanding of the roles of governmental and nongovernmental victim assistance programs. This discretionary grant program is designed to encourage state, local, and tribal governments and state, local, and tribal courts to treat domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking as serious violations of criminal law requiring the coordinated involvement of the entire criminal justice system. This program challenges the entire community to listen, communicate, identify problems, and share ideas that will result in new responses to ensure victim safety and offender accountability.

Summary: This Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) issued by the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), National Institutes of Health (NIH), invites investigator-initiated research grant applications for studies focused on the early identification and treatment of mental disorders in children and adolescents. Specific examples include studies focused on: the validation of early diagnosis of mental disorders in youth, especially in young children; the development of new interventions to treat mental disorders and prevent the exacerbation of associated functional impairment; the efficacy and safety of new and existing treatments; the identification and evaluation of predictors of treatment response and underlying mechanisms of action for new and existing treatments; the long-term effectiveness and impact of early intervention on later course; and the factors that promote or impede access to services and impact the effectiveness of services for these patients in community and practice settings. Assessment methods may include behavioral, neuropsychological, neuroimaging, and other physiological measures or markers. Intervention strategies to be studied may include pharmacological, psychosocial, and rehabilitative interventions, separately or in combination.

Grant Name: Health Disparities Among Minority and Underserved Women, CFDA #s 93.279 -- Drug Abuse and Addiction Research Programs, 93.361 -- Nursing

Research, 93.847 -- Diabetes, Endocrinology and Metabolism Research, 93.865

Funder: US Dept of HHS/NIH

Eligibility: Public/State Controlled Institution of Higher Education; Private Institution of Higher Education; Nonprofit with 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Nonprofit without 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Small Business; For-Profit Organization (Other than Small Business); State Government; Regional Organization; Other(s): Eligible agencies of the Federal government; Faith-based or community based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Because the nature and scope of the proposed research will vary from application to application, it is anticipated that the size and duration of each award will also vary. Summary: The purpose of this initiative is to stimulate research aimed at reducing health disparities among racial/ethnic minority and underserved women. More specifically, this initiative seeks applications for: (1) research related to health promotion or risk reduction among minority and underserved women age 21 and older; and, (2) intervention studies that show promise for improving the health profile of minority and underserved women.

Investigators responding to this announcement should focus on enhancing the body of knowledge of a variety of factors (e.g., social, economic, demographic, community, societal, personal, cultural) influencing the health promoting and health compromising behaviors of racial and ethnic minority women and underserved women and their subpopulations. The focus of this program announcement is on women age 21 and older, but investigators may also focus on the childhood antecedents of adult health disparities. -Each of the sponsors of

this initiative has a strategic plan, which addresses health disparities and minority health. This can be found on each of the respective web sites. For purposes of this initiative, the definitions of health disparities and minority populations are those outlined in the NINR s Strategic Plan on Reducing Health Disparities located at <http://www.nih.gov/ninr>

Grant Name: 4-H After-School Training Grants

Funder: MetLife Foundation through the National 4-H Council

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are 4-H extension professionals involved or interested in becoming involved with 4-H After-School programming.

Award Range/Funding Period: Only one (1) grant will be

awarded per state, to states who have the capacity to train at least 500 after-school providers. Awards are for \$10,000; 100% match is required.

Summary: The purpose of this program is to provide excellent training for after-school providers in order to improve the quality of after-school programs, encourage the infusion of civic engagement into these programs, and increase the number of youth engaged in high quality after-school programs. The goal of this program is to train at least 4,000 local after-

school providers by the end of FY 2007. Individual award recipients will be responsible for providing at least eight hours of training to 500 local after-school providers. After-school providers will be trained in the following:

- Quality school-age programming;
- Positive youth development;
- Experiential learning;
- Personality types;
- How to run an effective, efficient program for youth; and
- Leadership, cooperation, and communication skills.

FOUNDATION REVIEW PART IV



Name: Harry Frank Guggenheim Foundation.

Funding Priorities: Research grants on violence. The foundation welcomes proposals from any of the natural and social sciences and the humanities that promise to increase understanding of the causes, manifestations, and control of violence, aggression, and dominance. Highest priority is given

to research that can increase understanding and amelioration of urgent problems of violence, aggression, and dominance in the modern world. Particular questions that interest the foundation concern violence, aggression, and dominance in relation to social change, the socialization of children, intergroup conflict, interstate warfare, crime, family relationships, and investigations of the control of aggression and violence.

Award Size: \$15,000 - \$30,000/year for 1-2 years.

Eligibility: The foundation awards research grants to individuals for individual projects and does not award grants to institutions for institutional programs.

Review Cycle: August 1, for a decision in December.

Name: Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, Substance Abuse Policy Research Program.

Funding Priorities: The mission of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF) is to improve the health and health care of all Americans. One of its four goals is to reduce the personal, social, and economic harm caused by substance abuse—tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs. To that end, the Substance Abuse Policy Research Program (SAPRP) is a \$54 million Foundation initiative that focuses on analyzing and informing public and private policies aimed at reducing the harm caused by alcohol, drugs, tobacco, and multiple-substance use by encouraging experts in public health, law, political science, medicine, sociology, criminal justice, economics, psychology and other behavioral and policy sciences to address issues related to substance abuse. The goals of SAPRP are to:

- Support policy relevant, peer-reviewed research that increases understanding of policies for reducing harm caused by substance abuse
- Stimulate, help define, and inform the policy process with sound scientific information
- Grow the field of substance abuse policy research

Award Size: Large grants (\$100-\$400K); small grants (under \$100K); two other types of grants are listed without reference to award sizes: “Diversity Partnership Grants” for studies relating to alcohol, tobacco, and drugs, and “Targeted Rapid Response Grants” for studies relating to alcohol, tobacco, and drugs.

Eligibility: Preference will be given to applicants who are tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and are not private foundations as defined under Section 509(a).

Review Cycle: Large grant deadline has just passed (11/14/06); next small grant deadline is 5/8/07; other grants are accepted on a rolling basis.

Name: The Actuarial Foundation, Advancing Student Achievement Program

Funding Priorities: The Actuarial Foundation will consider proposals for funding of mentoring programs that involve actuaries in supporting the teaching and learning of mathematics.

Award Size: Not specified. Grant funding is for two years with evaluation conducted at the end of each year. The Foundation will consider a third year of funding to obtain needed resources to sustain the program long-term.

Eligibility: Grants may be awarded to local groups in the United States and Canada that can provide the support necessary to develop a network of mathematics mentors in the public and private school systems. Such groups include actuarial clubs and other education-oriented organizations.

Review Cycle: There are no deadlines.
