Grant Name: Research Demonstration and Dissemination Grants (R18), CFDA # 93.837, 93.233, 93.838, 93.839 (multiple research areas)

Eligibility: Public/State Controlled Institution of Higher Education; Private Institution of Higher Education; Nonprofit with 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Nonprofit without 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Small Business; For-Profit Organization (Other than Small Business); State Government; U.S. Territory or Possession; Indian/Native American Tribal Government (Federally Recognized); Indian/Native American Tribal Government (Other than Federally Recognized); Indian/Native American Tribally Designated Organization; Non-domestic (non-U.S.) Entity (Foreign Organization); Hispanic-serving Institution; Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs); Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities (TCCUs); Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions; Regional Organization; Other(s): Eligible agencies of the Federal government; Faith-based or community based organizations.

Funder: US Dept of HHS/NIH

Award Range/Funding Period: Maximum of 5 years, \$500K/yr.

Summary: The purpose of this Funding Opportunity Announcement (FOA) is to encourage the scientific community to conduct Demonstration and Dissemination (D and D) studies to test the effectiveness of interventions in children, adolescents, and/or adults to: (1) promote healthful behaviors; (2) reduce risk factors for heart, lung, and blood diseases, and sleep disorders; (3) improve the prevention or management of heart, lung, and blood diseases, and sleep disorders, including the delivery of health care services; and (4)

enhance understanding of the processes of intervention implementation and diffusion, or sustainability in a defined population, or defined clinical or community setting.

Grant Name: Transition Services That Lead to Competitive Employment Outcomes for Transition-Age Individuals With Blindness or Other

Visual Impairments, CFDA # 84.133A-4

Eligibility: States; public or private agencies, including for-profit agencies; public or private organizations, including for-profit organizations; institutions of higher education (IHEs); and Indian tribes and tribal organizations.

Funder: US Dept of Education

Award Range/Funding Period: \$450,000/yr, depending on final Congressional action. Project period up to 36 months. ONLY ONE GRANT WILL BE AWARDED.

Summary: The purpose of the DRRP (Disability and Rehabilitation Research Program) is to plan and conduct research, demonstration projects, training, and related activities to develop methods, procedures, and rehabilitation technology that maximize the full inclusion and integration into society, employment, independent living, family support, and economic and social self-sufficiency of individuals with disabilities, especially individuals with the most severe disabilities, and to improve the effectiveness of services authorized under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended.

Grant Name: Maximizing Protective Factors for Youth Violence, CFDA # 93.136

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit

organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations; federally recognized Indian tribal governments; Indian/Native American tribal government (federally recognized); Indian tribal government (other than federally recognized); Indian/Native American tribally designated organizations; state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents.

Funder: US Dept of HHS/CDC/National Center for Injury Prevention and Control

Award Range/Funding Period: Up to \$200,000 for the first year, two-year period. ONLY TWO AWARDS WILL BE MADE.

Summary: NCIPC is soliciting research applications to conduct secondary analyses of existing data to identify potentially modifiable protective factors for youth violence. This research will inform the development of youth violence prevention programs and policies by identifying promising protective factors that reduce the likelihood of violence in the lives of young people.

Grant Name: Research and Evaluation on the Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation of Elderly Individuals, Older Women, and Residents of Residential Care Facilities, CFDA # 16.560

Eligibility: States (including territories), local governments (including federally-recognized Indian tribal governments that perform law enforcement functions), nonprofit organizations (including faith-based and community organizations), profit organizations, institutions of higher education, and qualified individuals.

Funder: National Institute of Justice

Award Range/Funding Period: NIJ anticipates that up to \$1 million may become available for awards made through this solicitation. NIJ expects to make up to 4 awards depending on funds available and the number of high-quality applications received.

Summary: NIJ is soliciting proposals for research and evaluation in the area of abuse, neglect, and exploitation of elderly individuals, older women, and residents of residential care facilities. For the purpose of this solicitation, the term "abuse" includes physical abuse, sexual abuse, psychological abuse, abandonment and isolation, neglect, and financial or fiduciary abuse or exploitation perpetrated against any person over the age of 65 ("elderly"), women over the age of 50 ("older women"), or individuals of any age who reside in residential care facilities. The term "residential care facility" includes nursing homes; assisted living facilities; adult family care homes; adult care facilities for people with developmental, cognitive, or physical disabilities; and other residential facilities that provide services to the elderly, disabled, or persons needing long-term care.

Grant Name: The Alibris Collection Award

Eligibility: Academic, public, special, or K-12 libraries.

Funder: Alibris (on-line booksellers)

Award Range/Funding Period: An annual grant of up to \$3,000.

Summary: The award supports specific collection development projects that advance the mission, priority areas, and goals of the selected library. Each applying library must:

Quality Child Care...Our Only Care.

Grant Name: National Child Care Teacher Awards

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be employed in a home, group or center-based program which is fully compliant with local and state regulations for operating child care programs.

- Applicant must be working in their current regulated program for at least 36 months by November 26, 2006. It is acceptable to apply having worked for the same child care entity for 36 months in more than one location. If applicant is connected to U.S. Military child care facility, the applicant must be working in the current location for a minimum of 12 months.
- Applicant must work a minimum of 35 hours per week with the same children, 12 months per year.
- Programs must be open a minimum of 10 hours a day, 5 days a week - 12 months a year.
- Applicant must be a teacher of infant, toddler or preschool age children.
- Only one teacher per application may apply for this award.
- Only one application per center may be submitted.
- Multi-site agencies may submit one application per site.

Funder: The Terri Lynne Lokoff Child Care Foundation

Award Range/Funding Period: Award recipients will receive \$500 -- \$1000 as a stipend to acknowledge each child care teacher's special dedication, and \$500 to fund the classroom enhancement project they each designed.

Summary: The Awards acknowledge the critical role of child care teachers in providing quality child care. Applicants are required to design a project to enhance their classroom. The project should demonstrate the educational, social, and emotional benefits for the children and illustrate the critical role of the teacher.

Grant Name: (a) Italian Language Study Grants; (b) Culture and Heritage Grant Awards

Eligibility: Individuals and non-profit organizations

Funder: National Italian-American Foundation

Award Range/Funding Period: (a) \$500 – 2,000/yr. (b) \$2,000 – 15,000.

Summary: 1. Italian Language Study Grants

A matching grant program open to organizations, individuals, schools, and community groups that wish to launch or expand the teaching of Italian in their local public or private elementary, intermediate, or high schools. The grant money may be used to purchase teaching materials, pay teacher and/or teacher's aide's salaries, or for any legitimate and academically sound activity that furthers the study of Italian in the school for one academic year. The language program may be held before, after, or during school hours; full or part-time.

2. Culture and Heritage Grant Awards

Available to individuals or organizations pursuing projects to promote, research, educate or preserve Italian American culture, history or heritage. Examples include: documentaries, doctoral research, exhibits, conferences, books, media stereotyping/anti-defamation surveys, campaigns, etc., plays, and course syllabi.
