Grant Name: Abusive Head Trauma (AHT) Prevention, CFDA # 93.136

Funder: HHS/CDC

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit

organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Project period may not exceed 5 years; initial funding up to \$400K. Three awards will be made.

Summary: The purpose of the program is to evaluate strategies for the prevention of abusive head trauma (AHT). Applicants are expected to conduct a study on the effectiveness and cost-effectiveness of providing information to parents and other caregivers on preventing AHT. More specifically, projects will be sought that will allow comparisons of the impact of delivering such information in different settings on AHT and potential mediating factors for intervention effects.

Grant Name: Understanding Risk and Protective Factors for Sexual Violence Perpetration and the Overlap with Bullying Behavior, CFDA # 93.136

Funder: HHS/CDC

Eligibility: Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: 2 awards of up to \$300K each, for the first year of a three-year project period.

Summary: This program will assess the association between bullying experiences and co-occurring and subsequent sexual violence (SV) perpetration and test associations between these forms of violence and potentially modifiable risk and protective factors from multiple levels of social influence to determine the shared and unique risk and protective factors for bullying experiences and SV perpetration. Bullying experiences includes being a perpetrator, victim, or bystander of bullying. Co-occurring sexual violence perpetration refers to sexual violence that is perpetrated in the same time period as the bullying experiences. Subsequent sexual violence perpetration refers to sexual violence that is perpetrated in a time period after the bullying experiences. The sexual violence perpetration that is co-occurring or that happens subsequent to the bullying experiences can be perpetrated against the same person/people or against a different person/people than those who are involved in the bullying experiences.

Grant Name: Research on Mild and/or Unilateral Hearing Loss, CFDA # 93.173, 93.283.

Funder: HHS/NIH/CDC

Eligibility: Institutions of higher education, nonprofits, faith-based/CBOs.

Award Range/Funding Period: Project period limited to 2 years, with no more than \$275K in direct costs granted over the two-year period.

Summary: This program will further understanding of mild and unilateral hearing loss in infants and young children. This includes research on prevention, better diagnostic methods, and treatments for these forms of hearing loss that are often overlooked or minimized. Children with milder forms of hearing loss in one or both ears or any degree of hearing loss

in one ear can experience difficulties in the areas of speech, language, behavior, academic, and other aspects of development.

Grant Name: Statewide Family Network Grants, CFDA # 93.243

Funder: SAMHSA

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are domestic public and private nonprofit entities, including faith-based entities, tribal family organizations, and currently funded Statewide Family Network grantees that are family-controlled organizations and meet the following requirements:

- An applicant organization must be dedicated to the improvement of mental health services Statewide;
- An applicant must complete the Certification of Eligibility (see Appendix E of the RFA) indicating that the applicant meets all eligibility requirements. Applicants must also provide necessary supportive documentation.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$60,000 per year in total costs (direct and indirect); up to 10 grantees will receive an additional \$10,000 per year for projects that include a youth leadership component. Three year funding period.

Summary: The purpose of this program is to enhance State capacity and infrastructure to be more oriented to the needs of children and adolescents with serious emotional disturbances and their families. The Statewide Family Network Program builds on the work of the Child, Adolescent and Services Systems Program (CASSP), which helped to establish a child and family focus in programs serving children and adolescents with serious emotional disturbances around the country.
