Grant Name: Enrichment and Accelerated Learning Programs for Children.

Funder: Jack Kent Cooke Foundation

Eligibility: 501(c)(3)'s.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$100,000 - \$600,000 over a 3-year period.

Summary: The Foundation will make grants to nonprofit organizations seeking to provide access to accelerated learning or enrichment programs for low- to moderate-income students ages 5-12. The Foundation is open to a wide range of programming, including advanced math and reading courses, interdisciplinary inquiry-based enrichment, and distance learning. Additionally, programs may take place during the summer, after school, or during the school day.

Grant Name: Prevention and Support Services for Women

Incarcerated or Newly Released Living With or at Risk for HIV/AIDS/STDs Program, CFDA # 93.015.

Funder: US Dept of HHS, Office on Women's Health

Eligibility: 1. Organizations located in locations with high HIV prevalence among women; 2. Locations near incarcerated populations of women; and 3. Organizations indicating history of serving African American women, Hispanic women, substance abusing women, formerly incarcerated women, and women living with HIV/AIDS or whose lifestyles place them at high risk for HIV/STD infection. Eligible entities may include nonprofit community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, national organizations, colleges and universities, clinics and hospitals, research institutions, State and local government agencies, tribal government agencies and tribal/urban Indian organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Awards are capped at \$125,000 for a 12-month period, although the performance period is 3 years.

Summary: The primary purpose of this OWH HIV/AIDS program is to increase health related support services available for HIV infected incarcerated and newly released women. The goals for the Incarcerated/Newly Released Program are to:

- Develop and sustain comprehensive HIV/AIDS/STD prevention and support services to incarcerated and newly released women living with HIV/AIDS in collaboration with health entities, care providers, social services, correctional facilities, and criminal justice offices;

- Establish community linkages and networks for ensuring quality continuum of care, transitional support, discharge planning and preparation, and HIV/STD prevention services for incarcerated and newly released women living with or at high risk for HIV/AIDS;

- Improve the physical and mental health circumstances as well as the quality of life of incarcerated and newly released women living with HIV/AIDS or at high risk for HIV infection.

Grant Name: Youth Leadership Program: Diversity, Democracy, Globalization, and Citizenship (no CFDA #).

Funder: US State Department

Eligibility: Applications may be submitted by public and private non-profit organizations meeting the provisions described in Internal Revenue Code section 26 USC 501(c)(3).

Award Range/Funding Period: Approximately 14-20 months' duration. One award of \$245,000 will be made.

Summary: This is an open competition for the "Youth Leadership Program: Diversity, Democracy, Globalization, and Citizenship" in which the participating countries will be Turkey, Germany, and the United States. Public and private non-profit organizations meeting the provisions described in Internal Revenue Code section 26 USC 501(c)(3) may submit proposals to recruit and select 30-40 youth and adult participants overseas and in the United States, to provide the participants with a 25- to 30-day U.S.-based exchange program,

and to support follow-on activities for the alumni. The program will be designed to promote high-quality leadership and civic responsibility among future leaders and will enable the Turkish, German, and American participants to explore diversity and the expression of and respect for individual beliefs as citizens in democratic nations. The program will enable approximately 30-40 teenagers (ages 16-18) and adult educators to participate in an intensive, thematic project in the United States for approximately four weeks that allows for open discussion of the roles and responsibilities of a citizen in a democracy, lessons in critical thinking about various approaches to governance and respect for different perspectives, and the expression of identity and values. Leadership development, community service, and the development of a global point of view of are also elements of this program.

Grant Name: Mentoring Program, CFDA # 84.184B

Funder: US Dept of Education, Office of Safe and Drug-Free Schools.

Eligibility: (1) Local educational agencies (LEAs); (2) nonprofit, community-based organizations (CBOs), which may include faith-based organizations; and (3) a partnership between an LEA and a non-profit CBO.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$100,000 - \$200,000; project periods up to 36 months.

Summary: This program provides assistance to promote mentoring programs for children with greatest need that: (1) Assist these children in receiving support and guidance from a mentor; (2) improve the academic performance of the children; (3) improve interpersonal relationships between the children and their peers, teachers, other adults, and family members; (4) reduce the dropout rate of the children; and (5) reduce juvenile delinquency and involvement in gangs by the children.
