**Grant Name:** Adolescent Family Life (AFL) Demonstration Projects, CFDA # 93.995

**Funder:** US Dept of HHS, Office of Population Affairs

**Eligibility:** Any public or private nonprofit organization or agency is eligible to apply for a grant. However, only those organizations or agencies that demonstrate the capability of providing and thoroughly evaluating the proposed services and which meet the statutory requirements will be considered for grant awards. Faith-based and community-based organizations are encouraged to apply.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** \$300,000 to \$400,000 per budget year for a 5-year cycle.

**Summary:** These grants are for prevention demonstration projects to provide and evaluate innovative abstinence education activities and services targeting youth ages 9-18 and their parents. The primary purpose of AFL prevention demonstration programs is to find effective means, within the context of the family, of reaching pre-adolescent and adolescent children before they become sexually active to encourage them to abstain from premarital sexual activity. (The OAPP also encourages reaching out to those adolescents who may have already become sexually active to encourage them to return to abstinence and support them in doing so.) Under this announcement, the OAPP is expecting intensive evaluations of the demonstration projects it supports. To this end, the OAPP is requesting applications from projects that have dedicated 20-25% of the proposed budget to evaluation activities.

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**Grant Name:** Weed and Seed Communities Competitive Program, CFDA # 16.595

**Funder:** US Dept. of Justice, Community Capacity Development Office

**Eligibility:** Eligible entities include local, state, tribal governments or nonprofit organizations in communities with a persistent high level of serious violent crime (Part I) pursuant to this guide, which have not previously received Weed and Seed Official Recognition (OR), and do not share (in whole or in part) any boundaries with a previously recognized Weed and Seed site. Faith-based or other community organizations are eligible.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** CCDO may award up to *\$1 million* (with 25% match) in Weed and Seed funding to each community over the 5-year eligibility period:

*Year 1: \$175,000*

*Year 2: \$250,000*

*Year 3: \$275,000*

*Year 4: \$200,000*

*Year 5: \$100,000*

**Summary:** The Weed and Seed strategy aims to prevent, control, and reduce violent crime, criminal drug-related activity, and gang activity. The Weed and Seed strategy is a community-based, comprehensive multi-agency approach. Four elements make up the two-pronged Weed and Seed Strategy: Law Enforcement; Community Policing; Prevention, Intervention, and Treatment; and Neighborhood Restoration. A Weed and Seed Community (WSC) must be developed in partnership with a variety of key local organizations and the local United States Attorney's Office (USAO). WSCs must work to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for residents in a community primarily through the redeployment of existing public and private resources, addressing both crime and social related problems that without proper intervention often lead to violent crime, drug abuse, and gang activity.

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**Grant Name:** Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health across the US (REACH US), CFDA # 93.283

**Funder:** US Dept of HHS, CDC

**Eligibility:** Public nonprofit organizations, private nonprofit organizations, for profit organizations, small, minority, women-owned businesses, universities, colleges, hospitals,

community-based organizations, faith-based organizations, state and local governments or their Bona Fide Agents.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** Centers of Excellence: \$800,000 - \$1.2MM for the first 12-month budget period. Action Communities: \$350,000 - \$400,000 for the first 12-month budget period. Total project period is 5 years.

**Summary:** These funds will advance evidence and practice based programs and culturally based community practices to eliminate racial and ethnic health disparities through implementation, evaluation, and dissemination of state of the art knowledge. This initiative, Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health across the US (REACH US), addresses racial and ethnic differences in health disparities, rather than focusing primarily on a disease perspective. It builds on the body of knowledge initiated by projects funded under Racial and Ethnic Approaches to Community Health 2010 (REACH 2010). Current funding for REACH US will move into establishing a national multilevel program through two levels of interlinked funding: 1) Centers of Excellence in the Elimination of Disparities (CEEDs) will serve as national expert centers by providing the infrastructure to implement, coordinate, refine, and disseminate programmatic activities, and 2) Action Communities (ACs) will implement and evaluate successful practice-based or evidence-based approaches/programs to impact population groups rather than individuals.

**Grant Name:** Mentoring Children of Prisoners, CFDA # 93.616

**Funder:** US Dept of HHS/ACF

**Eligibility:** State governments, county governments, local Governments, city or township governments, independent school districts, public and State-controlled institutions of higher education, non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), non-profits without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), others (See below), special district governments, Faith-based and community organizations that meet the statutory eligibility requirements are eligible to apply under this announcement.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** Maximum of \$100,000 per annual budget period; project period is 3 years.

**Summary:** This program supports the creation and maintenance of one-on-one mentoring relationships between children of incarcerated parents and caring, supportive adult mentors. The intent of this program is to support the establishment or expansion and operation of mentoring programs, using a network of public and private community entities, in areas with substantial numbers of children of incarcerated parents. The MCP program is designed to be a community-based mentoring program in which children and youth ages four up to age 18, are appropriately matched with an adult mentor, who has been screened and trained, for a one-on-one (one mentor/one youth), friendship-oriented (non curriculum-based) mentoring relationship.

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**Grant Name:** Healthy People and Healthy Communities through Improved Environmental Health Service Delivery, CFDA # 93.283  
**Funder:** US Dept of HHS/CDC

**Eligibility:** State and local governments or their bona fide agents

**Award Range/Funding Period:** Award ceiling is \$135,000/yr for 3 years.

**Summary:** This funding opportunity supports community efforts to improve the health and built environment of underserved populations by building effective environmental health programs and enhancing the delivery of environmental health services.

Environmental health services may be defined as programs that ensure that communities have adequate air and water quality, access to safe food and shelter, effective vector control programs; and efficient or functional waste management systems, etc. The built environment is the space in which people live, work, and play. Funded activities should seek to understand how improved environmental health service delivery can support new or existing health efforts to reduce or eliminate environmental factors that are associated with or can contribute to causes for diseases and conditions. By doing so, program activities can thus help to eliminate disparities in health outcomes that are related to environmental conditions.

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**Grant Name:** Street Outreach Program, CFDA # 93.557  
**Funder:** US Dept of HHS/ACF

**Eligibility:** Non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than

institutions of higher education), non-profits without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education). Faith-based and community organizations that meet the statutory eligibility requirements are eligible to apply under this announcement.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** A maximum of \$200,000 per annual budget period; project period 36 months.

**Summary:** SOP is one of the programs authorized by the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act, 42 USC sections 5701 through 5752 to address runaway and homeless youth problems. SOP's purpose is to conduct outreach services designed to build relationships between grantee staff and street youth. A range of education, intervention, and prevention services are offered to youth who are at risk of being subjected to sexual abuse or

exploitation. The goal of these efforts is to help young people leave the streets and assist in moving and adjusting to a safe and appropriate living arrangement.

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### **SMALLER GRANTS**



**Grant Name:** Domestic Grantmaking Program

**Funder:** Mattel

**Eligibility:** 501(c)(3) charitable organizations who demonstrate that they directly serve children in need, with an annual budget < \$1MM.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** \$5,000 - \$20,000 for program or operating costs.

**Summary:** Organizations must have a mission that focuses on the direct service of children ages zero to 12 years. We encourage only organizations with a mission of serving children, rather than broader social service charities, to apply. Organizations or programs must show *creative* and/or *innovative* methods to address locally defined need directly impacting children. Organizations or programs must align with Mattel's philanthropic priorities:

**LEARNING** - Increasing access to education for underserved children and in particular, innovative strategies to promote and address literacy.

**HEALTH** - Supporting the physical health and well-being of children, with particular emphasis on promoting healthy, active lifestyles.

**GIRL EMPOWERMENT** - Promoting self-esteem in young girls, up to age 12.
