Grant Name: Claude D. Pepper Older Americans Independence Centers (OAICs) and Coordinating Center, CFDA # 93.866
Funder: US Dept of

HHS/NIH

Eligibility: For-profit organizations, Non-profit organizations, Public or private institutions, such as universities, colleges, hospitals, and laboratories, Units of State government, Units of local government, Eligible agencies of the Federal government, Domestic Institutions (see website for additional details).

Award Range/Funding Period: The anticipated number of awards is four new and/or competitive renewal OAIC Center awards and one OAIC Coordinating Center, totaling about \$4.6MM.

Summary: The Claude D. Pepper Older American Independence Centers (OAIC) program was established in honor of the late Representative to establish "centers of excellence" in geriatrics research and training. The goal of the OAIC program is to increase scientific knowledge that will lead to better ways to maintain or restore independence in older persons. The OAIC awards are designed to develop or strengthen each awardee institution's programs that focus and sustain progress on a key area in aging research. Each area of focus is one in which progress could contribute to greater independence for older persons and offer opportunities for training and career development in aging research for young scientists. The ultimate goal is to enhance translation of basic and developmental research on aging to applications and

interventions that increase or maintain independence for older persons. NIA's expectation is that an OAIC, in a given area of focus, will:

- Provide intellectual leadership and innovation;
- Stimulate translation between basic and clinical research, e.g., research to develop or test interventions or diagnostic tests based on new findings from basic aging research or other basic research, or studies to improve understanding of mechanisms contributing to clinical or functional findings;
- Facilitate and develop novel multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary research strategies;
- Stimulate incorporation of emerging technologies, methods and scientific advances into research designs as appropriate;
- Serve as a source of advice and collaboration to other institutions regarding technology, methodology, analysis, or other expertise; and
- Provide career development for future research leaders. An OAIC Coordinating Unit was implemented in 2005 to promote scientific collaborations among Pepper Center investigators and to facilitate the sharing of unique resources across all sites.

Eligibility: Nonprofits having 501(c)(6) status as Trade Associations and Chambers of Commerce, Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education.

Award Range/Funding Period: 9 awards at a ceiling of \$1.35MM

Summary: This request solicits competitive proposals from business centered community-based organizations, transportation-related trade association, colleges and universities, community colleges or chambers of commerce for participation in OSDBU's Small Business Transportation Resource Centers (SBTRC) under the Minority Resource Center (MRC) program. OSDBU will enter into Cooperative Agreements with these organizations to outreach to the small business community in their designated region.

Grant Name: FY 2007 Schools Chemical Cleanout Campaign (Sc3) Grant, CFDA # 66.808

Funder: US EPA

Eligibility: Government agencies and instrumentalities; and non-profit organizations that are not 501(c)(4) organizations that lobby, including non-profit educational institutions and non-profit hospitals. Individuals and for-profit organizations are not eligible.

Award Range/Funding Period: 1-2 cooperative agreements for a total available funding of \$150,000.

Summary: This program supports an innovative project that advances the goals of the "Schools Chemical Clean-out Campaign (SC3)." The proposed project should be a demonstration, training, outreach and/or education project that uses the lessons learned from other chemical management programs to develop a new or expand an existing program that makes available and improves chemical management in the K-12 schools of a community. Across the country, outdated, unknown, or excessive amounts of chemicals are found in kindergarten through grade 12 (K-12) schools. Accidental spills of these chemicals endanger students and staff, result in school days lost, cost millions of dollars to clean up each year, and are, in many instances, preventable. These chemicals can be found in various places within a school, including maintenance areas, vocation shops, science laboratories, art classrooms, and nurse's offices. Mismanaged chemicals represent one of the critical environmental health and safety issues schools can address to improve the learning environment for children and provide a healthy workplace for teachers and staff.

In 2004 the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) launched the Schools Chemical Cleanout Campaign (SC3), as part of the Resource Conservation Challenge (RCC). SC3 is intended to facilitate implementation of programs that promote removal of existing accumulations of outdated and dangerous chemicals from schools; raise national awareness of the potential risks posed to students and school personnel from mismanaged chemicals; and prevent future chemical mismanagement. The ultimate purpose of SC3 is to reduce chemical exposures and improve chemical management in K-12 schools.

Grant Name: National Community-Based Lead Outreach and Training Grant Program, CFDA # 66.718

Funder: US EPA, Office of Prevention, Pesticides and Toxic Substances

Eligibility: Eligible recipients are those who have the ability to

directly address childhood lead poisoning prevention for the local communities. This includes a wide range of potential applicants, such as national environmental consulting firms, children's advocacy and health groups, and faith-based and nonprofit organizations. Other groups include local governments, institutions of higher learning, trainers, school groups, and community-based organizations. EPA supports partnerships formed between national and local organizations to perform activities within a community. Organizations must represent communities that have not received a federal or state lead poisoning prevention grant in the past.

Award Range/Funding Period: EPA anticipates awarding approximately \$1.5 million under this announcement. An applicant from one group, consortium, coalition, or any partnerships formed by two or more groups or organizations may receive one award for up to \$250,000 under this program. It is anticipated that approximately 6-8 awards will be made.

Summary: The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is soliciting grant proposals from eligible entities to reduce incidences of childhood lead poisoning in low-income communities with older housing. Potential activities include outreach, training, ordinance development, and other activities that would result in reduction of childhood lead poisoning. This grant will support the partnership of national organizations with community-based organizations and local governments to improve the environmental health of a community regarding lead poisoning prevention.

Grant Name: Cooperative Agreements for Early Identification and Intervention Demonstration, CFDA # 96.007

Funder: Social Security Administration

Eligibility: Private institutions of higher education, State governments, Special district governments, For profit organizations other than small businesses, County governments, City or township governments, Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, Nonprofits

having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, Public and State controlled institutions of higher education

Award Range/Funding Period: SSA will award up to two cooperative agreements at up to \$300,000 for the 2-year life of each cooperative agreement funded.

Summary: The Social Security Administration (SSA) is making cooperative agreement funding available to support a project that will design and implement effective, replicable, and sustainable models which will increase the number of children (birth to age 5) who receive developmental screening and improve the early identification of children with developmental delays and/or disabilities. This cooperative agreement will target children from birth to age 5 from the following populations: minority, un-served, underserved, native populations, homeless, premature infants, parental depression or serious emotional disturbance, foster care, low-income, inner city, rural, children affected by substance abuse or withdrawal symptoms resulting from prenatal drug exposure, and children involved in a

substantiated case of child abuse. Applicants should show how they intend to assure that participants from diverse populations are served by the project. Applicants must specify the geographic area to be covered by the project.

Due Date: Letter of Intent, 2/5/07 (a postcard will suffice, see FR notice); Application, 3/14/07. The intent notice is not required and not binding.

Grant Name: Special Improvement Projects, CFDA # 93.601

Funder: HHS/ACF/Office of Child Support Enforcement

Eligibility: Eligible applicants for these SIP grants are State Human Services Umbrella agencies, other State agencies (including State IV-D agencies), local public agencies (including IV-D agencies), non-profit organizations (including faith-based and community-based organizations and universities such as Historically Black Colleges and Universities) and consortia of State and/or local public agencies.

Award Range/Funding Period: Over the past five years, OCSE has awarded an average of 11 grants per year, totaling approximately \$1.3 million per year. All grant awards are subject to the availability of appropriated funds. A non-Federal match is not required. The anticipated start date for the new awards is July 3, 2006; projects under Priority 1 may run through June 30, 2010, for a period of up to 48 months; projects under Priority 2 may run through June 30, 2008, for a period of up to 24 months; and projects under Priority 3 may run through June 30, 2009, for a period of up to 36 months.

Summary: Program Purpose and Objectives. To fund a number of special improvement projects, which further the national child support mission to ensure that all children receive financial and medical support from their parents and which strengthen the ability of the nation's child support programs to collect support on behalf of children and families. OCSE is looking for innovative projects that promote some of the basic themes of the national strategic plan in that child support should be a reliable source of income for families; and that child support agencies should use early prevention strategies to help build a culture of compliance in which parents will support their children voluntarily and reliably. We invite applications for partnerships with entities such as courts and/or tribunals and community- and faith-based organizations, which have the ability to address the needs of harder-to-serve populations, such as low-income non-custodial parents and culturally diverse populations.

Priority Area 1: Promoting Healthy Relationships for Unwed Couples to Improve Children's Financial and Medical Security. **Priority Area 2:** Improving Child Support by Encouraging Parents and CSE Agencies to Work Together for Better Case Management and Results. **Priority Area 3:** Expand and Improve Enforcement/Collection Tools.

Grant Name: Aspiring Principal Training Program

Funder: The Broad Foundation

Eligibility: Eligible school districts (Cincinnati Public Schools is eligible), Non-profit organizations and universities working with eligible school districts, Charter management organizations (CMOs) operating in eligible school districts.

Award Range/Funding Period: Not specified.

Summary: The Broad Foundation plans to increase its investments in training programs that develop strong, high-quality principals in urban schools and is seeking proposals. Mounting evidence shows that strong, trained school leaders are a critical lever to increase student achievement. We will accept proposals from school districts, charter school management organizations, non-profit organizations and universities to develop, implement or expand high-quality aspiring principal programs that will recruit, train, place and support school leaders.
