Grant Name: HIV Prevention Grants
Funder: US Conference of Mayors
Eligibility: Federally recognized Indian tribes, Local health departments,

Community-based organizations who are 501(c)(3)s, existing agencies/consortia which have formed collaborative efforts between multiple groups or agencies.

Award Range/Funding Period: Track One (targets Native Americans): 3 grants of \$60,000 each for 12 months; Track Two (targets African American or Hispanic women): 5 grants of \$70,000 each for 12 months.

Summary: The purpose of these grants is to reduce risk behaviors associated with HIV/AIDS among Native Americans and among African American and Hispanic women at high risk of HIV infection, and to strengthen the ability of organizations--in particular organizations with direct ties to the target populations--to respond to future needs for HIV prevention services among these groups.

Grant Name: Wellstone Fellowship for Social Justice

Funder: Families USA, Minority Health Initiatives Dept.

Eligibility: Candidates seeking consideration for the Wellstone Fellowship must demonstrate an interest in health care policy and racial and ethnic health disparities. Applicants should also demonstrate a commitment to contributing to social justice work following their year of hands-on experience as a fellow. While there is no bias in favor of any specific academic discipline, a college degree is preferred. There is no minimum GPA to qualify for consideration.

Award Range/Funding Period: One fellow is elected each year, and will receive a stipend of \$35,000 with excellent health care benefits. The fellowship runs from 8/07 to 7/08.

Summary: The Wellstone Fellow plays an integral role in the work of Families USA's Minority Health Initiatives Department. The Wellstone Fellow's primary responsibilities include assisting in the organization of trainings for community leaders and journalists and drafting policy briefs, fact sheets, and other publications. During the year, the Wellstone Fellow will learn about Medicare, Medicaid, efforts to achieve universal coverage, and other important health policy issues. Specifically, the fellow will learn how these issues play a role in reducing racial and ethnic health disparities and improving the health of communities of color. At the same time, the Wellstone Fellow will learn about conducting health care campaigns through communication and collaboration with our network of state grassroots advocates and organizations.

Grant Name: Drug Court Discretionary Grant Program, CFDA # 16.585

Funder: US Dept. of Justice/BJA

Eligibility: Applicants are limited to states, state and local courts, counties, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments, acting directly or through other public or private entities.

Award Range/Funding Period: Implementation Grants, \$350,000 maximum, 24 month project period. Enhancement Grants, \$200,000 maximum, 12 month project period.

Summary: Implementation grants are available to jurisdictions that have completed a substantial amount of planning and are ready to implement an adult drug court. Jurisdictions who are in the planning stages should consider participation in BJA's Drug Court Planning Initiative (DCPI). DCPI provides training, technical assistance, and travel support to assist jurisdictions in planning a new drug court program. Enhancement grants are available to jurisdictions with a fully operational (at least 1 year) adult drug court to: provide additional services to drug court participants; develop and provide training programs for drug court practitioners; evaluate a drug court; develop or implement an automated data collection system for the court; or meet the special needs of certain drug court participants, including individuals addicted to methamphetamine; individuals suffering from co-occurring mental health issues; members of cultural and language minorities; and individuals coping with severe traumatic experiences.

Grant Name: Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP)
Funder: Ohio Dept. of

Development

Eligibility: Non-entitlement counties and cities with an approved Community Housing Improvement Strategy or included in a nonparticipating jurisdiction consortium; or entitlement cities located in a nonparticipating county with an approved Consolidated Plan and meeting CHIS requirements.

Award Range/Funding Period: For FY 2006, the grant ceiling is \$500,000 - communities may apply for up to \$50,000 in additional funding in order to expand a rental rehabilitation component or to construct or rehabilitate a home in conjunction with a local Habitat for Humanity affiliate.

Summary: The Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) provides grants to eligible communities interested in undertaking housing-related activities, including necessary infrastructure improvements. The grants are awarded competitively and encourage a flexible, community-wide approach to the improvement and provision of affordable housing for low- and moderate-income persons, and help develop local administrative capacity.

Grant Name: Maximizing Protective Factors for Youth Violence, CFDA # 93.136
Funder: US Dept of HHS/CDC
Eligibility: Public nonprofit

organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Two awards of up to \$200,000 for first year of funding, project period up to 2 years.

Summary: The purpose of the announcement is to solicit (U49) research applications to conduct secondary analyses of existing data to identify potentially modifiable protective factors for youth violence. This research will inform the development of youth violence prevention programs and policies by identifying promising protective factors that reduce the likelihood of violence in the lives of young people.

Grant Name: Family Drug Courts Program, CFDA # 16.585

Funder: US Dept. of Justice/OJJDP

Eligibility: States, state courts, local courts, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments, acting directly or through agreement with other public or private entities, faith-based and community organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: Maximum awards of \$450,000, for a project period up to 3 years, 25% match required.

Summary: The goal of the Family Drug Courts Program is to build the capacity of states, state courts, local courts, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments to develop and establish drug courts for substance-abusing adults who are involved with the family court due to child abuse and neglect issues. The Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (Public Law 103-322) provides the statutory authority for this program. The program provides seed money and does not provide long-term support. It is expected that successful applicants will develop and begin implementation of a sustainability plan during the course of the grant period in order to continue the operation of the family drug court once the grant period ends.

Grant Name: Transitional Housing Assistance Grants for Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Stalking and Sexual Assault, CFDA # 16.736

Funder: US Dept. of Justice, Office on Violence Against Women

Eligibility: These grants may be awarded to States, units of government, Indian tribes, and other organizations, including domestic violence and sexual assault victim service providers, domestic violence and sexual assault

coalitions, other nonprofit, nongovernmental organizations, or community-based and culturally specific organizations, that have a documented history of effective work concerning domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking.

Award Range/Funding Period: A maximum of \$350,000; 36 month project period.

Summary: This grant program focuses on a holistic, victim-centered approach to provide transitional housing services that move individuals into permanent housing. Grants made under this grant program support programs that provide assistance to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking who are in need of transitional housing, short-term housing assistance, and related support services. It is critical that successful transitional housing programs provide a wide range of flexible and optional services that reflect the differences and individual needs of victims and that allows victims to choose the course of action that is best for them. Transitional housing programs may offer individualized services such as counseling, support groups, safety planning, and advocacy services as well as practical services such as licensed child care, employment services, transportation vouchers, telephones, and referrals to other agencies. Trained staff and case managers may also be available to work with clients to help them determine and reach their goals.

Grant Name: Alzheimer's Disease Pilot Clinical Trials (R01), CFDA # 93.866

Funder: US Dept. of HHS/NIH

Eligibility: Public/State Controlled

Institution of Higher Education; Private Institution of Higher Education; Nonprofit with 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Nonprofit without 501(c)(3) IRS Status (Other than Institution of Higher Education); Small Business; For-Profit Organization (Other than Small Business); State Government; Regional Organization; Other(s): Eligible agencies of the Federal government; Faith-based or community based organizations.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$400,000/yr for 3 years.

Summary: In 1999, at the direction of Congress, the National Institute on Aging (NIA), in conjunction with the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke (NINDS), the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH), and the National Institute of Nursing Research (NINR) embarked on the Alzheimer's Disease (AD) Prevention Initiative, which encompasses a number of interrelated efforts including basic, epidemiological, behavioral, and clinical research. An important part of the AD Prevention Initiative is to quicken the pace for translating basic science findings into clinical trials to evaluate treatment and prevention strategies. This funding opportunity announcement (FOA) focuses on AD pilot clinical trials while another FOA is targeted to AD drug discovery. In this FOA the NIA invites qualified investigators to submit research grant applications for pilot clinical drug trials directed toward the prevention and treatment of the cognitive and behavioral symptoms of mild cognitive impairment (MCI), Alzheimer's disease (AD), and age-related cognitive decline.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$1,000 – \$5,000, no period specified.

Summary: Provides funds for programs in the areas of arts, advocacy and education to nonprofit organizations which are led by or support adults with disabilities. We encourage distinctive projects that change the face of disability in a community. These programs impact the lives of people with disabilities and are supported

by the local community including foundations, corporations and individual funders. It is ELA's vision to "Change the Face of Disability on the Planet" by providing grant support for the implementation of "cutting edge" programs.
