Grant Name: Project Safe Childhood Programs, CFDA # 16.543

Funder: US DOJ/OJJDP

Eligibility: OJJDP invites applications from private organizations (including faith- and community-based nonprofit community organizations).

Award Range/Funding Period: Part A. A total of \$2.5 million is available under Part A. OJJDP will award up to three cooperative agreements of up to \$1,000,000 each, for periods of 24 to 36 months. OJJDP may choose to award more awards depending on the breadth and scope of applications received. Part B. A total of \$1.5 million is available under Part B. OJJDP will award up to five cooperative agreements, for periods of 12 to 36 months. OJJDP may choose to award more awards depending on the breadth and scope of applications submitted.

Summary: The Project Safe Childhood (PSC) initiative combats the proliferation of technology-facilitated sexual exploitation crimes against children. The dangers presented by sexual predators soliciting children over the Internet and the production, possession, and electronic distribution of child pornography demand a coordinated response. PSC facilitates collaboration among U.S. Attorneys, Internet Crimes Against Children Task Forces, and other national and community groups to investigate, prosecute, and prevent technology-facilitated criminal behavior and to protect and assist victimized children and youth. This solicitation seeks applicants to promote and support PSC by submitting proposals to OJJDP under either Part A or Part B. Part A requests proposals for collaboration with OJJDP to develop community awareness and public education programs which can be delivered to national audiences and to specific target populations. Part B requests proposals to develop and deliver Internet safety training and education in discrete communities.

Grant Name: Smaller Learning Communities Program, CFDA # 84.215L

Funder: US Dept of Ed, Office of Elementary and Secondary Education

Eligibility: Local education agencies (LEAs)

Award Range/Funding Period: Awards depend on high school size, as follows:

SLC Grant Award Ranges

Student enrollment	Award ranges per school
1,000-2,000 Students.....	\$1,000,000-\$1,250,000
2,001-3,000 Students.....	1,000,000-1,500,000
3,001 Students and Up.....	1,000,000-1,750,000

Project periods are 36 months., with an additional 24 months contingent upon available funding. School districts may receive a total of \$14MM for multiple high schools.

Summary: The Smaller Learning Communities (SLC) program awards discretionary grants to local educational agencies (LEAs) to support the implementation of SLCs and activities to improve student academic achievement in large public high schools with enrollments of 1,000 or more students. SLCs include structures such as freshman academies, multi-grade academies organized around career interests or other themes, "houses" in which small groups of students remain together throughout high school, and autonomous schools-within-a-school, as well as personalization strategies, such as student advisories, family advocate systems, and mentoring programs.

Grant Name: Assets for Independence Demonstration Program, CFDA # 93.602

Funder: US Dept of HHS/ACF

Eligibility: State governments; county governments; city or township governments; special district governments; independent school districts; state controlled institutions of higher education; public housing authorities; and non-profits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education.

Award Range/Funding Period: Project period is 60 months with a period ceiling of \$1MM.

Summary: The purpose of this program is to establish and administer Assets for Independence (AFI) Projects. These projects assist low-income people in becoming economically self-sufficient. They do so by teaching project participants about economic and consumer issues and enabling them to establish matched savings accounts called Individual Development Accounts (IDA) in order to save for a first home, a business or higher education. Grantees must participate in an on-going national evaluation of the impact of AFI Projects and IDAs.

Due Date: This is a standing announcement. It is effective until canceled or changed by the Office of Community Services. Applicants may submit applications at any time throughout the year. OCS will review and make funding decisions about applications submitted by any of three due dates: March 15, June 15 and November 1.

Grant Name: Compassion Capital Fund Communities Empowering Youth Program, CFDA # 93.009.

Funder: US Dept of HHS/ACF

Eligibility: Public and State-controlled institutions of higher education, non-profits with 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), non-profits without 501(c)(3) IRS status (other than institutions of higher education), private institutions of higher education, for-profit organizations (other than small businesses), small businesses. Faith-based and community organizations that meet the statutory eligibility requirements are eligible to apply under this announcement.

Award Range/Funding Period: \$250,000 per 12-mo. budget period for 36 months.

Summary: ACF will award funds to build the organizational capacity of experienced organizations, their collaborating faith-based and/or community partners, and the resulting community collaborations to better meet the needs of America's disadvantaged youth. The applicant will assist its collaborating faith-based and/or community partners through training, technical assistance, and financial assistance. The applicant will provide training and technical assistance in four CEY critical areas: 1) leadership development, 2) organizational development, 3) program development, and 4) community engagement. Ultimately, CEY monies are to be used by the lead organization and its collaborating faith-based and/or community partners to increase the overall effectiveness of their community collaboration while increasing the organizational sustainability and capacity of the individual collaboration members. Capacity building activities are designed to increase the collaboration's and the individual organizations' sustainability and effectiveness and to enhance their ability to provide social services to better serve those most in need.

Grant Name: Juvenile Drug Courts/Reclaiming Futures, CFDA # 16.585

Funder: US DOJ/OJJDP

Eligibility: Applicants are limited to states, state courts, local courts, and units of local government, acting directly or through agreement with other public or private entities. Faith-based and other community organizations are encouraged to apply.

Award Range/Funding Period: 4 awards of up to \$425,000 will be made for a project period of 4 years.

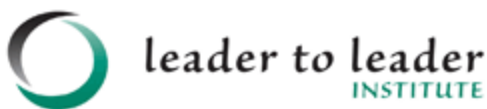
Summary: The U. S. Department of Justice's Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Center for Substance Abuse Treatment, and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation are collaborating to enhance the capacity of states, state and local courts, units of local government, and Indian tribal governments to serve substance-abusing juvenile offenders by developing and establishing juvenile drug courts conjointly with the Reclaiming Futures program model. The juvenile drug court is a community-based approach that builds community partnerships and enhances the capacity of the partners to assist in rehabilitating substance-abusing youth through an innovative, integrated approach that reflects the community's norms, values, resources, and needs. The Reclaiming Futures model has been effective in combining community system reforms, treatment improvement and community engagement to help youth break the cycle of drugs and crime. The merger of the drug court and Reclaiming Futures program models will enhance the capacity of communities to provide intervention, treatment, and structure to young people whose lives have begun a downward spiral of substance abuse and delinquent activity. This solicitation invites communities to propose the implementation of a juvenile drug court program, using best practices in substance abuse treatment, along with the Reclaiming Futures program model.

Grant Name: Great American Bake Sale

Funder: Share Our Strength

Eligibility: Grants will only be awarded to nonprofit 501(c)(3) organizations, schools with a valid NCES code, or local government entities that work to ensure

children have access to after school and summer meal programs.

In addition, organizations must also do at least ONE (1) of the following in order to be eligible to apply for a grant from this program:

1. Sponsor USDA-reimbursed after school and/or summer meal programs for school-age children. Organizations applying for grants in this category will be required to submit proof of their certification to receive reimbursement from the USDA for the meals and snacks they serve through the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP), the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), or the National School Lunch Program (NSLP).
2. Work to increase participation in USDA-reimbursed after school and summer meal programs through outreach and advocacy.

Award Range/Funding Period: Two types of grants will be offered through the Great American Bake Sale grants program:

Grants for Program Sponsors

Grants will be awarded to organizations that directly sponsor USDA-reimbursed afterschool and/or summer meal programs for children. Grants will specifically support projects designed to increase participation in the organization's USDA summer and afterschool meal programs. Grant awards will range from \$5,000-\$15,000.

Grants for Advocacy

Grants will be awarded to organizations that work to increase participation in USDA-reimbursed afterschool and summer meal programs through outreach and advocacy. Grants will support projects designed to increase participation in afterschool and summer meal programs through advocacy. Organizations engage in advocacy when they work with schools, community organizations, local businesses, and with a range of government officials to increase participation in summer and afterschool meal programs. Grant awards will range from \$5,000-\$15,000.

Summary: Share Our Strength's Great American Bake Sale® grants program helps ensure that low-income children receive nutritious food during critical times when they are out of school and particularly vulnerable to hunger. By increasing access to nutritious meals outside of school hours, we can help end childhood hunger in communities across the country. The Great American Bake Sale grants program will support efforts to increase participation among low-income children in summer and after school meal programs. Share Our Strength is specifically interested in increasing participation in meal programs that utilize USDA-reimbursement through the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), National School Lunch Program (NSLP), or Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). Nonprofit organizations that work to increase the number of children that receive nutritious after school and summer meals may be eligible to apply for funds raised through the Great American Bake Sale.
