**Grant Name:** Start-Up Seed Money

**Funder:** Heineman Foundation

**Eligibility:** 501 (c)(3)s.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** \$20,000 - \$50,000 per year for 3-5 years.

**Summary:** The purpose of the Heineman Foundation is to provide seed money to start-up projects and new projects within existing organizations. The Heineman Foundation's areas of interest include workforce support for economically challenged women; environmental research to improve water quality; music appreciation in education and culture; research into prevention, education, and treatment of childhood illnesses; and youth support for opportunities to think, create, and communicate effectively.

**Grant Name:** Youth Violence  
Prevention through Community-Level  
Change, CFDA # 93.136.  
**Funder:** US HHS/CDC

**Eligibility:** Public nonprofit organizations; private nonprofit organizations; for profit organizations; small, minority, and women-owned businesses; universities; colleges; research institutions; hospitals; community-based organizations; faith-based organizations.

**Award Range/Funding Period:** Two annual awards of up to \$500,000 will be made, for project periods up to 5 years.

**Summary:** This program will assess the efficacy or effectiveness of interventions designed to change community characteristics and social processes to reduce rates of youth violence perpetration and victimization. Youth violence has been linked to a variety of factors, including individual, family, community, and societal characteristics. Although much research has been conducted on interventions to change the characteristics of individuals and families, fewer interventions have focused on changing variables at the broader community level. Funds are available to examine the effects of a community-level intervention on rates of youth violence. Funds are intended to support new evaluations rather than to supplement or support long-term extensions of existing effectiveness studies of community-level interventions. This program addresses the "Healthy People 2010" focus area(s) of Injury and Violence Prevention.

**Grant Name:** Young Men at Risk:  
Transforming the Power of a  
Generation.

**Funder:** This program is co-sponsored  
by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and Changemakers.

**Eligibility:** Open

**Award Range/Funding Period:** Three awards of \$5,000 each will be given. Awardees of this program will also be eligible to apply to the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Vulnerable Populations Portfolio, through which up to \$1 million will be available to support promising innovations.

**Summary:** The purpose of this competition is to identify innovative approaches to supporting men ages 15 to 25 in fulfilling their potential and become healthy, successful adults. Approaches should help young men to avoid gangs, addiction, crime, violence, and mental health issues faced by this demographic, particularly among minority groups. Examples of innovative programs include using dance to address domestic violence and music to promote improved mental health. Entries to the competition should be well formulated and beyond the "idea stage."
