Grant Name: Economic Development and Community Vitality Grants

Funder: Duke Energy Foundation

Eligibility: Recipients must be organizations with a 501(c)(3)

verification from the IRS or are a part of a governmental entity.

Award Range/Funding Period: Not specified.

Summary: Economic Development: Skills development, including job entry skills for the new economy and retraining of unemployed and underemployed workers; Pre K-12 education focused on math, science and technology; Higher education, government or other non-profit initiatives designed to support innovative solutions for business/industry/workforce challenges. Community Vitality: Health and human services through United Way, arts & culture, energy assistance, public safety; Community leadership development/capacity building.

Grant Name: Infant and Child Nutrition

Funder: Gerber Foundation

FOUNDATION

Eligibility: Organizations recognized as tax-exempt under *Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3)* are eligible to apply for Foundation grants. Organizations must also be determined not to be private foundations under *Internal Revenue Code 509*.

Award Range/Funding Period: Only vaguely defined: grants that are local in scope area assumed to be under \$50,000. Grants are limited to 36 months.

Summary: The foundation's mission focuses on infants and young children. Accordingly, priority is given to projects that improve infants' and young children's nutrition, care, and development from the year before birth to three years of age. Programs should support a specific health or nutrition intervention and have defined outcome parameters. The foundation gives priority to projects of national or regional impact. Projects should be sufficiently focused to make an appreciable difference in the field of interest.
